**Subject**: Resolution authorizing the City Manager to enter into a first amendment of the intergovernmental agreement with the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community for the receipt and administration of grant funds. Citywide



### **Purpose and Recommendation**

The requested resolution will authorize the City Manager to sign a first amendment to the Intergovernmental Agreement on behalf of the City of Mesa with the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community (SRP-MIC) to receive an additional \$109,154.00 in proposition 202 funds to be used for city departments' services and programs.

### Background

Proposition 202, passed with the 2002 Gaming Compact in Arizona, directs participating Tribal Governments to share 12% of their gaming revenues with surrounding local governments.

On October 19, 2015, through Resolution No. 10688, the City Council accepted and agreed to distribute \$575,375.00 In Proposition 202 Funds for use by City of Mesa departments and community use programs.

### Discussion

The SRP-MIC has elected to distribute an additional amount of \$109,154.00 to the City of Mesa. SRP-MIC does not require a resolution of support for applicants to apply for funding. However, the City must first enter into an Intergovernmental Agreement with SRP-MIC for the receipt and use of funds.

### Alternatives

The only alternative to authorizing this Intergovernmental agreement is to deny it. Such action would negate the city's ability to accept the additional \$109,154.00 in Prop 202 funds.

## **Fiscal Impact**

Acceptance of this funding will add \$109,154 in grant funds to city services and programs. This equates to a positive fiscal impact for the city.
