Subject: Mesa Fire and Medical Department (MFMD) Fees and Charges

Purpose and Recommendation

The purpose of this report is to submit for review and consideration recommended new fees and charges for Low Risk Occupancy Fire Inspections and minor changes to Photos/CD requests provided by the Mesa Fire and Medical Department (MFMD).

Background/Discussion

Low Risk Occupancy Fire Inspections:

MFMD currently has an annual inspection program for High Risk commercial occupancies and a biennial inspection program for Medium Risk commercial occupancies. Low Risk commercial occupancies receive unofficial inspections/education using volunteers. During the recent accreditation process, it was recommended that Low Risk occupancies should be formally inspected by a Fire Inspector on a triennial basis. The City's current program does not meet the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) standards and the program is voluntary for the businesses, resulting in some of the businesses refusing the service. MFMD personnel occasionally find low risk occupancies that have changed their usage and should be classified as a medium risk occupancy. In addition to the desire to meet NFPA standards, a low risk inspection program would ensure that businesses are properly classified and inspected in a timely manner to mitigate risk. Keeping citizens safe is of the highest importance to MFMD.

The City of Mesa has 4,052 Low Risk occupancies, resulting in the need to inspect 1,350 businesses annually. The existing inspectors cannot take on the additional workload and an additional inspector will be needed. Once the new inspector is on board, all inspectors will incorporate low risk occupancies into their workload to take advantage of geographic efficiencies.

As inspections will now be completed by trained inspectors, the fee needs to be modified for similarity to the other businesses in Mesa. Periodically, a low risk occupancy requests an official inspection for insurance purposes. The medium risk rate has been used to reimburse the City for expenses. Staff recommends continuing the use of this fee for the low risk occupancy inspection program. The impact to the low risk business is lower than the medium risk business, as low risk inspections will only be performed every three years. Definitions of the four categories are found in Attachment 1.

MFMD Photo/CD Requests:

MFMD currently charges for Hazardous Materials Site Surveys and Photos/CD-ROMs of Fire Investigations, Motor Vehicle Accidents (MVA), etc.

Staff recommends removing Photos & additional photos as an option and only offer CDs. Verbiage would be changed to remove ROM and to add PER HOUR to the unit of Hazardous Materials Site Survey to clarify how the fee is charged.

Alternatives

- Take no action. Maintain the fees and charges for services provided by the Department in the previously approved areas. Medium risk occupancy inspection rate would continue to be used for low risk occupancy inspections when requested by the business. Low risk proactive program would not be implemented.
- Recommend alternative adjustments to the proposed fees and charges. The
 fiscal impact of this decision would depend on the changes proposed. If a low
 risk proactive program is implemented with a lower fee amount, the program
 would operate at partial cost recovery.

Fiscal Impact

If the annual portion of all low risk inspections are performed (1,350), the annual revenue would be \$206,550. Based on current inspector workload and the addition of one inspector, the annual estimate for completed low risk inspections is 888, which equates to \$135,864. This revenue covers the cost associated with the additional inspector needed to perform the low-risk inspections.

Coordinated With

The recommended fees and charges were coordinated with the Mesa Fire and Medical Department and the Office of Management and Budget.
