

COUNCIL MINUTES

January 28, 2013

The City Council of the City of Mesa met in a Study Session in the lower level meeting room of the Council Chambers, 57 East 1st Street, on January 28, 2013 at 5:00 p.m.

(Mayor Smith excused Vice Mayor Somers and Councilwoman Higgins from the entire meeting. He also excused Councilmember Glover from the beginning of the meeting; he arrived at 5:11 p.m.)

Review items on the agenda for the January 28, 2013 Regular Council meeting.

All of the items on the agenda were reviewed among Council and staff and the following was noted:

Conflict of interest: None.

Items removed from the consent agenda: None.

Assistant Police Chief Mario Lattanzio, Director of Fleet Services Pete Scarafiotti and Police Sergeant Brent Olson displayed a PowerPoint presentation (See Attachment 1) and discussed Item 4-d (Purchase of Four (4) New Law Enforcement Vehicles (Tahoes) for the Police Department) on the Regular Council Meeting agenda.

Director of Water Resources Kathryn Sorensen and Water Resources Advisor Colette Moore displayed a PowerPoint presentation (See Attachment 2) and discussed Item 5-d (Approving and authorizing the City Manager to execute the Amended and Restated White Mountain Apache Water Rights Quantification Agreement with various parties, including a Lease Agreement for Central Arizona Project Water with the City of Mesa, the White Mountain Apache Tribe and the United States) on the Regular Council Meeting agenda.

2-a. Hear a presentation, discuss and provide direction on the 2012 Bicycle Master Plan.

Director of Transportation Dan Cleavenger introduced Senior Transportation Engineer Mark Venti and Planner II James Hash, who were prepared to address the Council.

Mr. Cleavenger reported that the Bicycle Master Plan, which is included on tonight's Regular Council meeting agenda for adoption (Item 5-h), is the culmination of three years of work by City staff. He noted that if the City had hired a consultant to create the Plan, it most likely would have incurred an estimated \$200,000 in costs.

Mr. Cleavenger advised that staff's outreach efforts for the Plan were well coordinated, including the creation of a citizen working group, a technical advisory group (comprised of City employees), and conducting public meetings in each Council District. He said that the Plan was not only reviewed and recommended for Council adoption by the Transportation Advisory Board (TAB), but also the Sustainability and Transportation Committee.

Mr. Venti displayed a PowerPoint presentation (See Attachment 3) and reviewed the Bicycle Plan Vision Statement. (See Page 2 of Attachment 3) He explained that the vision of the Plan conforms with the City's current vision, especially as it relates to the development of light rail, the establishment of downtown college campuses, the construction of the Chicago Cubs Stadium, various improvements in the Fiesta District, and the general urbanization of the community. He said that now is a perfect time to develop an idea and a vision for an alternative mode of transportation, such as bicycles.

Mr. Hash briefly highlighted the goals and objectives of the Bicycle Plan (See Pages 3 and 4 of Attachment 3), which were compiled as a result of input solicited from the public, the working groups and the collection of various survey data. He pointed out that the identified goals "match" the League of American Bicyclists' Bicycle Friendly Community objectives. Mr. Hash noted that one of staff's goals is to achieve the designation of a "Platinum Level" Bicycle Friendly Community by 2022. He added that performance measures will be established in an effort to ensure that the goals are met.

Mr. Hash remarked that at the present time, the City of Mesa has an effective Child Bicycle Safety Education Program, but lacks in the area of Adult Bicycle Safety Education. He stated that with the assistance of the Maricopa Association of Governments (MAG), staff intends to develop "a more robust" program in that regard.

Mr. Hash indicated that the City's Transportation Department will once again host the Arizona Bicycle Festival, which is held in cooperation with the El Tour de Mesa. He advised that staff will work with the Mesa Police Department (MPD) in order to provide police officer re-education briefings. Mr. Dash said that in addition, staff will offer training/bicycle safety programs in the court system in an effort to defer fines for individuals who receive bicycle-related citations.

Mr. Venti continued with the presentation and briefly discussed the different types of bike facilities. (See Page 6 of Attachment 3)

Mr. Venti displayed a series of maps and reviewed the network needs and the top 40 projects that were identified within the six Council Districts. (See Pages 7 through 13 of Attachment 3) He explained that through the efforts of the citizen working group and City employees, soliciting

public comments, using various computer methodology, and assessing the manner in which the network would connect with the region, staff was able to determine where there were gaps within the existing system with respect to bike lanes, bike routes and shared-use paths.

In response to a comment from Councilmember Kavanaugh, Mr. Venti clarified that a map for District 3 was inadvertently deleted from the presentation materials. He assured Councilmember Kavanaugh that staff has identified projects in District 3.

Mr. Hash provided a short synopsis of the recommendations for program expansion as follows:

- Programs for Adult Bicyclists
- Bicycle Diversion Program
- Safe Routes to School
- Bicycle Media Campaign
- Bicycle Tourism Packet

Mr. Hash advised that staff recognizes that Mesa is "a bicycle destination" and that many people travel to Arizona for the bicycle-riding experience. He said that for that reason, it was important to promote Mesa as a Bicycle Friendly Community.

Councilmember Kavanaugh commended staff for their efforts and hard work and noted that the Bicycle Master Plan has evolved tremendously. He recounted that in 1983, he and his Dobson Ranch neighbors worked to convince the City to install bike lanes. He noted that although there was initially significant "push back" from staff, such an idea eventually "caught on." He added that the Plan is outstanding and takes into consideration many different components for residents and tourists.

Councilmember Finter stated that the new canal bike path in District 2 is widely used and stressed the importance of having a safe place for people to ride. He also recognized that a few bicycle tragedies have occurred in the community and said that the residents are appreciative of Mr. Cleavenger and his staff for their efforts and hard work with respect to the Bicycle Master Plan.

Councilmember Richins expressed appreciation for the Plan's emphasis on the "Safe Routes to School" Program. He noted that although his children live within biking distance of their schools, in his opinion, it is just not safe for them to do so at this time. He added, however, that he would encourage that the program be prioritized to ensure that it remains ongoing.

Mayor Smith thanked staff for their efforts.

2-b. Appointments to Council, Regional and other Boards and Committees.

It was moved by Councilmember Kavanaugh, seconded by Councilmember Glover, that the Council concur with the Mayor's recommendations (See Attachment 4) and the appointments be confirmed.

Mayor Smith declared the motion carried unanimously by those present.


White Mountain Apache Tribe Quantification Agreement

January 28, 2013



White Mountain Apache Tribe

- Around 12,000 tribal members
- 1879 Reservation boundaries established in
- Encompasses 1.67 million acres
- Contains much of the Salt River watershed





Settlement Terms

- Tribe will have rights to 52,000 acre-feet per year (AF/Y)
- 23,000 AF/Y Salt River basin.
- 4,000 AF/Y Little Colorado River basin
- 25,000 AF/Y Central Arizona Project (CAP) water
- Non-Indian Agricultural Priority





Benefits to Mesa

- Certainty
- Rights to the Salt River and its tributaries are clarified
- Tribe will waive various claims regarding water rights and water quality damages





Leased Water

- Mesa will lease 866 AF/Y of high priority CAP water and 2,291 AF/Y of lower priority CAP Water for a term of 100 years
- No capital charges associated with leased charges apply CAP water, but Fixed O&M and Energy




