

#### **COUNCIL MINUTES**

July 8, 2025

The City Council of the City of Mesa met in the Study Session room at City Hall, 20 East Main Street, on July 8, 2025, at 4:46 p.m.

Mayor Freeman conducted a roll call.

Mayor Freeman excused Councilmembers Goforth and Heredia from the entire meeting.

1. Review and discuss items on the agenda for the July 8, 2025, Regular Council meeting.

All of the items on the agenda were reviewed among Council and staff and the following was noted:

Items removed from the consent agenda: 5-c

2-a. Hear a presentation, discuss, and provide direction on the proposed Audit Plan for FY 2025/2026.

City Auditor Joseph Lisitano displayed a PowerPoint presentation. (See Attachment 1)

Mr. Lisitano provided an overview of the Audit Plan and discussed the work in progress. (See Pages 2 through 4 of Attachment 1)

Mr. Lisitano reviewed the audits scheduled for Fiscal Year (FY) 2026 and noted that while the City Clerk's Office is not always responsible for fulfilling the public records requests, the program is administered through their office. He indicated that the Police Department has their own process for public records requests and is separate from the City Clerk's Office. (See Page 5 of Attachment 1)

Mr. Lisitano discussed the follow-up reviews conducted on the audit recommendations made last year. (See Pages 6 and 7 of Attachment 1)

Mr. Lisitano summarized other activities performed by the Auditor's Office. He noted that as cash has become less prominent, the Biennial Citywide Cash Handling Audit is conducted over a two-year period and reported every two years instead of annually. (See Page 8 of Attachment 1)

In response to a question from Councilmember Spilsbury, Mr. Lisitano explained the process if a Councilmember requests an audit. He mentioned that he sends requests to Council for input and includes ideas in the audit plan.

Responding to a question from Councilmember Adams, Mr. Lisitano advised that the Auditor's Office can conduct financial audits; however, typically does not since their approach is risk based, and the City has external auditors to examine the finances. He stated that staff primarily conducts operational or performance audits, which involves reviewing policies and procedures, assessing controls, and ensuring proper implementation.

Mayor Freeman thanked staff for the presentation.

2-b. Hear a presentation, discuss, and receive an update on previously-approved improvement projects, including projects funded by 2018, 2020, 2022, and 2024 general obligation bonds.

City Engineer Lance Webb displayed a PowerPoint presentation. (See Attachment 2)

Mr. Webb provided an overview of the active General Obligations (G.O.) bond projects. He presented a snapshot of the challenges associated with the bonds that were approved by the public, when the bonds were approved, and the financial impact due to inflation primarily during 2021 through 2023. (See Pages 2 and 3 of Attachment 2)

Mr. Webb summarized the 2018 bond projects, which are mostly completed, and provided status updates on the dog park at Countryside Park, Signal Butte Park Phase 2, Lehi Crossing Shared Use Path, the Eastern Canal Shared Use Path, and the Gateway Library. (See Pages of 4 through 10 of Attachment 2)

Mr. Webb presented a graph associated with the approved 2020 transportation bonds and compared the estimated project costs between 2020 to 2024. (See Page 11 of Attachment 2)

Responding to a question from Councilmember Adams, Mr. Webb explained that, after the cost increases experienced with the 2020 transportation bonds, staff began building a contingency into the 2022 and 2024 bonds.

Mayor Freeman commented that the Central Reuse Pipeline project was originally \$90 million and ended up at approximately \$205 million.

Vice Mayor Somers acknowledged that the Engineering Department did an excellent job of acquiring equipment early on, avoiding higher costs and delays for the Gateway Library project.

Mr. Webb summarized the status of the 2020 bond projects. He reviewed the projects in relation to the reimbursement that the City would seek associated with the bond for Maricopa County Association of Governments (MAG) funds. He indicated that several arterial reconstruction projects were deferred due to a lack of funding, while others proceeded only through the design phase with construction remaining unfunded. (See Pages 12 and 13 of Attachment 2)

In response to a question from Councilmember Duff, Mr. Webb clarified that sometimes bond funding for certain projects are paired together to see them through to completion.

City Manager Scott Butler stated that one of the priorities of the Engineering and Transportation Departments is to maximize the MAG dollars and Proposition 400 dollars allocated to the City to ensure no monies remain.

Interim Transportation Director Erik Guderian elaborated on the amount the City will receive from MAG reimbursements once projects are constructed.

Mr. Webb clarified that the "Other Funding" column on Page 12 refers specifically to the local street sales tax and the transportation fund, which differs from the other funding sources used by other departments, utilities, or related project support.

Mr. Webb discussed a few of the projects, several of which are MAG reimbursement associated, such as Broadway Road between Mesa Drive and Stapley Drive. He commented that the reimbursements with MAG are quarterly and he described the process. (See Page 14 of Attachment 2)

In response to a question from Councilmember Duff, Mr. Guderian explained that Shared Use Paths (SUP) fall under the category of Transportation; however, in 2018, as part of the bond package, the pathway projects fit within the categorization of the Parks Bond.

In response to a question posed by Councilmember Spilsbury, Mr. Guderian answered that the only work on Mesa Drive related to the Broadway Road Project may involve traffic control through the intersection, as the project limits are east of Mesa Drive.

Mr. Webb continued with updates on the Elliott Road and Ellsworth Road improvement projects, from Germann to Ray Road, and stated that the City is collaborating with surrounding groups to communicate the planned sequencing and any related traffic control issues. (See Pages 14 and 15 of Attachment 2)

Mr. Guderian pointed out that the two projects on Ray Road will be coordinated to avoid them taking place simultaneously.

Mr. Webb reviewed additional street improvement projects on Ray Road, Ellsworth Road and the Val Vista Drive. (See Pages 15 and 16 of Attachment 2)

Responding to a question from Councilmember Spilsbury, Mr. Webb stated that the Central Reuse Pipeline Project on Greenfield Road is mostly complete, except for minor traffic control remaining for pressure testing.

Councilmember Spilsbury suggested notifying neighborhood groups regarding road improvements as much as possible.

Mr. Webb provided an overview of the 2022 bonds projects primarily for Public Safety and pointed out that \$24.7 million from 2018 was carried forward for the fire apparatus replacement and is an ongoing effort with the Fire Department. He discussed the progress of the Fire Station 205 rebuild, and construction of Fire Stations 223 and 224. (See Pages 17 through 19 of Attachment 2)

In response to a question from Mayor Freeman, Mr. Butler pointed out that Engineering has done a great job ensuring the City is maximizing shared infrastructure for the Fire Station 223 site. He mentioned that the delay was caused by remediation issues, which are currently being addressed, and will provide the benefit of coordinating shared utilities to serve both the communications building and the site.

Mr. Webb outlined the progress for the expansion of the Public Safety Training Facility. (See Page 20 of Attachment 2)

Responding to a question from Councilmember Adams, Mr. Webb described the scope of the work for the Public Safety Training Facility expansion with the goal of determining the specific needs in the area.

Assistant Fire Chief John Locklin discussed the plans for building additional facilities and expanding existing facilities for the Police and Fire Departments, and the challenges associated with parking during events.

Mr. Webb reviewed the Police Headquarters remodel timeline. (See Page 21 of Attachment 2)

Mr. Webb summarized the 2024 bond projects. He noted that the Northeast Mesa Regional Trail System is bond funded only for the trailhead used, and most of the corridor is set up for access. He presented the site layout for the Public Safety Communications Facility, adding that the site is in the concept phase and required Council feedback regarding the use of the site. (See Pages 22 through 28 of Attachment 2)

In response to a question posed by Councilmember Adams, Mr. Webb explained that the primary focus of the design/layout of the facility is to maintain safety.

Mr. Webb indicated that Countryside Park has been identified as a potential site for an indoor recreation center and explained the process to determine the site. (See Page 29 of Attachment 2)

Responding to an inquiry from Mayor Freeman, Mr. Butler clarified that the potential indoor recreation center is still several years away and that staff must consider Council's direction, secure additional assurances about the overall programs, and evaluate the facility's operational viability once constructed.

Councilmember Spilsbury expressed concern regarding newer facilities rather than upgrading older facilities and would like more community feedback.

Mr. Butler explained that the City will not rush the process and will seek public input in the area before any final decisions are made. He noted that at the request of Council, staff will be providing quarterly updates on the bond projects so Councilmembers remain informed.

In response to a question from Councilmember Spilsbury, Parks, Recreation, and Community Facilities Director Andrea Moore explained that the concept of the playground and improvements are discussed during public meetings, as well as through community feedback.

Mayor Freeman thanked staff for the presentation.

#### 2-c. Appointments to various boards and committees.

It was moved by Councilmember Adams, seconded by Councilmember Spilsbury, that the Council concur with the Mayor's recommendations and the appointments be confirmed. (See Attachment 3)






