*5-a. One-Year Term Contract for Forensic DNA Supplies for the Mesa Public Safety Support Department. (Sole Source). **(Citywide)**

The Biology Unit of the Forensic Services Division completes DNA analysis of samples from criminal investigations conducted by the Police Department as well as Gilbert, Queen Creek, and the Tempe Police Department. The Department is requesting the purchase of supplies needed, including reagents and consumables to determine the quantity of DNA present, to make copies of DNA, and to detect DNA on genetic instruments. No other vendor offers these products for our processes and equipment.

The Mesa Public Safety Support Department and Procurement Services recommend authorizing the purchase with the sole source vendor, Thermo Fisher, at \$250,000, based on estimated requirements. The funding source for these supplies are paid from operations budget that consists of funds from each agency covering the cost of their DNA analysis.

*5-b. Three-Year Term Contract with Two-Year Renewal Options for CCTV Camera Replacement for the Transportation Department. **(Citywide)**

The Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS) group currently operates over 350 closed circuit television (CCTV) cameras that are used for real-time monitoring traffic conditions. This contract is for furnishing, modification, and installation of cameras and related equipment for the City's ITS group on an as-needed basis and as cameras meet their useful life. Work will consist of furnishing cameras and related parts, installation, removal, and replacement of cameras, cable, and wireless access points.

The Transportation Department and Procurement Services recommend awarding the contract to the lowest, responsive, and responsible bidder, Fire Security Electronics & Communications, Inc., at \$175,000 annually with an annual increase allowance of up to 5% or the adjusted Consumer Price Index.

- *5-c. Three-Year Term Contract with Seven-Year Renewal Options for Sewer, Manhole, Siphon Cleaning, Video and Repair Services for the Water Resources Department. **(Citywide)**

The City requires contracted services with technical capabilities and expertise for sewer system maintenance and inspection. These services include cleaning and inspecting gravity sewer mains, manholes and siphons; documenting findings; performing cured-in-place point repairs; and responding to emergency situations. Each vendor is being recommended for award in the categories for which they submitted a response. Having multiple contractors ensures required routine maintenance and emergency repairs/support is provided to guarantee that critical infrastructure remains dependable.

A committee representing the Water Resources Department and Procurement Services evaluated responses and recommend awarding the contract to the highest-scored responsive, and responsible proposals from B&F Contracting; Duke's Root Control, Inc.; Insituform Technologies, LLC; Pro Pipe Inc; and Safe Site Utility Services of Arizona, LLC at \$2,000,000 annually with an annual increase allowance of up to 5% or the adjusted Consumer Price Index.

- *5-d. Dollar Limit Increase to the Term Contract for Bronze Water Service Valves, Fittings, and Hydrants for the Materials and Supply Warehouse. (for the Water Resources Department). **(Citywide)**

This contract provides a variety of water service valves, fittings, hydrants, and repair parts that are stocked in the Materials and Supply Warehouse for use by Water Resources for the maintenance of the City's water distribution system and City-owned fire hydrants. This is a shared contract between the Materials and Supply Warehouse and the Water Resources Department. The dollar limit increase is necessary due to increased operational needs. These components are essential to the City's water distribution system and are required to support both routine maintenance and emergency repairs.

The Business Services and Water Resources Department and Procurement Services recommend increasing the dollar limit with Arizona Water Works Supply; Core and Main LP; Ferguson Enterprises LLC, dba Ferguson Waterworks; and Fortiline Waterworks Inc. (a Mesa business), by \$350,000, from \$1,706,000 to \$2,056,000, through 1/25/2026.

A tobacco smoke shop is requesting a new Series 10 Beer and Wine Store License for Mojo Smoke Palace 1 LLC, 1211 North Country Club Drive, Suite 6 - Jeffrey Rodriguez, agent. There is no existing license at this location. **(District 1)**

Thomas Dearholt, a Mesa resident, addressed the Council in opposition to the proposed liquor license. He requested that the application be denied, citing the proximity of a nearby childcare facility, which he stated constitutes a code violation.

Mayor Freeman announced that the following citizens submitted a comment card in opposition to the proposed liquor license:

In response to a request from Mayor Freeman, City Attorney Jim Smith clarified that the Council serves as a pass-through body for liquor license applications providing a recommendation that is ultimately decided by the State Liquor Board. He noted that the proximity to licensed childcare facilities is one factor used to determine compatibility according to State law.

Business Services Director Ed Quedens explained that, based on staff review, the application did not appear to conflict with code and therefore their recommendation would remain to approve the application. He verified that if the application is denied by the Council, the State Liquor Board would further evaluate the application to resolve the matter.

Responding to a question from Councilmember Adams, Mr. Smith stated that due to statutory time constraints, the City is required to provide a recommendation at this meeting.

It was moved by Councilmember Adams, seconded by Vice Mayor Somers, that the recommendation to approve a new Series 10 Beer and Wine Store License for Mojo Smoke Palace 1 LLC be denied.

7-b. Purchase of an Integrated Data Platform Solution for the Mesa Police Department. (Sole Source). **(Citywide)**

This platform will create a real-time decision and operations management system which will unify data across multiple sources. This creates a single interface for investigators, analysts, and command staff to securely access, correlate, and act upon data from disparate systems. The Arizona Department of Administration has appropriated funding to provide for the implementation, maintenance, and support of a Law Enforcement Records Management System to be used by multiple agencies across Arizona. The initial pilot project includes platform licensing, configuration, and initial implementation

services. There is no obligation to renew services after the pilot period. The initial contract term is for one year beginning December 15th, 2025.

The Mesa Police Department and Procurement Services recommend authorizing the purchase of an integrated data platform with the sole source vendor, Peregrine, at \$216,000 based on estimated requirements for a pilot program. The costs for the pilot program will be funded by the Arizona Department of Administration.

Lynda Patrick-Hayes, a Mesa resident, expressed support for effective communication tools for law enforcement but voiced concerns about the Integrated Data Platform (IDP), citing potential privacy issues and what she views as an infringement on constitutional rights.

Police Commander Jason Reno explained that the initial rollout of the Integrated Data Platform (IDP) pilot will be limited to two internal data sources: the Police Department's Records Management System, and the computer-aided dispatch system. He emphasized that no other data sources will be included in the pilot and confirmed the system will not access any Fire and Medical Department Emergency Medical System documentation or data from Flock cameras.

In response to a question from Councilmember Taylor, Commander Reno stated that integration of additional data sources would require new funding and direction from the Council and would therefore be subject to future discussion at the conclusion of the pilot.

It was moved by Vice Mayor Somers, seconded by Councilmember Goforth, that the purchase of an Integrated Data Platform Solution for the Mesa Police Department be approved.

Mayor Freeman stated that agenda Item 8-a will be continued to the January 26, 2026, Regular Council Meeting agenda.

- 8-e. An ordinance amending and adopting Mesa City code park regulations sections 6-10-2, 6-10-4, 6-10-7, and 6-10-8 to allow the use of certain electric bicycles, electric scooters and other motorized and non-motorized vehicles in city parks and shared-use paths, subject to certain limitations. **(Citywide)** – Ordinance No. 5994

David Winstanley, a Mesa resident, spoke in opposition to the proposed code amendment and described multiple unsafe encounters with high-speed e-bikes and other electric devices in parks and shared-use paths. He asked Council to address several concerns before proceeding, including the need for clearer terminology in the code, improved public education efforts, and the installation of speed-limit signage. He also requested lowering the proposed speed limit from 20 mph to 15 mph.

Responding to a question from Councilmember Taylor, Mr. Smith confirmed that the definitions in the ordinance mirror state statute and align with terminology used by other municipalities, which limits the City's ability to change them. He acknowledged that signage and outreach materials can be written in plain language to help residents understand the rules.

Councilmember Adams expressed concerns with the proposed code amendment and stated that he would not support approval of the ordinance.

Mayor Freeman acknowledged the concerns and noted that the ordinance can be amended in the future if needed. He stated that establishing a baseline framework is necessary to address damage occurring in City parks and to enable enforcement when requested by neighborhoods and expressed his support for the ordinance.

Councilmember Duff pointed out that enforcement will not involve constant police presence but will allow officers to respond when recurring issues or complaints arise. She explained that the ordinance provides a clear standard for what is allowable so that the Police Department has the tools to address violations when necessary.

Vice Mayor Somers recalled that a comparable ordinance was under consideration at the state level and supported approval of the code amendments as proposed.

It was moved by Vice Mayor Somers, seconded by Councilmember Heredia, that Ordinance No. 5994 be adopted.

Mayor Freeman declared the motion carried by majority vote.

9-b. Proposed amendments to Chapters 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 10, 31, 86, and 87 of Title 11 of the Mesa City Code pertaining to Battery Energy Storage Systems. The amendments include but are not limited to: adding definitions for Battery Energy Storage System, Battery Energy Storage System Facility, Augmentation, and Nameplate Capacity; modifying land use tables to add Battery Energy Storage System and Battery Energy Storage System Facility; establishing development and other standards specific to Battery Energy Storage System Facilities. **(Citywide)** – Ordinance No. 5976

13. Items from citizens present.

Jason Smithson, a Mesa resident, expressed opposition to the 287(g) Cooperation Agreement with the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), stating the program limits access to essential educational support and creates instability for families. He requested that the Council place the item on a future agenda for a formal vote to cancel the agreement.

Regi Bron, a Mesa resident, spoke in opposition to the 287(g) program, emphasizing potential economic and community impacts on Mesa's Asian District. He noted significant imported wealth, increased tourism, and recent private investment in the area, arguing that heightened federal immigration enforcement could deter visitors, disrupt businesses, and threaten continued growth. He asked Council to formally reject participation in the 287(g) task force to maintain community safety, protect local businesses, and preserve the district's economic momentum.

August Palmisano, a Mesa resident, raised concerns about increasingly heavy flight-training activity at Falcon Field and noted that the number of flight schools operating there has grown significantly resulting in a dramatic rise in low-flying aircraft over nearby neighborhoods. He encouraged Council to prioritize the health, safety, and the economic well-being of the affected communities as future discussions on this issue move forward.
